

#### Preamble

We, the Clergy and Laity of the Episcopal Church, resident in that portion of the State of Texas, constituting what is known as the Episcopal Diocese of Fort Worth, do hereby ordain and establish the following constitution:

#### ARTICLE, 1-

#### AUTHORITY OF GENERAL CONVENTION

The Church in this Diocese accedes to the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Church in the United States of America, and recognizes the authority of the General Convention of said Church.

#### ARTICLE 13

#### TITLE TO CHURCH PROPERTY

The title to all real estate acquired for the use of the Church in this Diocese, including the real property of all parishes and missions, as well as Diocesan Institutions, shall be held subject to control of the Church in the Episcopal Diocese of Fort Worth acting by and through a Corporation known as "Corporation of the Episcopal Diocese of Fort Worth." All such property as well as all property hareafter acquired for the use of the Church and the Diocese, including parishes and missions, shall be vested in Corporation of the Episcopal Diocese of Fort Worth.

The Corporation of the Episcopal Diocese of Fort Worth shall hold real property acquired for the use of a particular parish or mission in trust for the use and benefit of such parish or mission. The income from such property shall belong to such parish or mission, which will be responsible for expenses attributable thereto. Such property may not be conveyed, leased, or encumbered by the Corporation of the Episcopal Diocese of Fort Worth without the consent of the Rector, Mardens and Vestry of such parish or mission. Upon dissolution of such parish or mission, property held in trust for it shall revert to said Corporation for the use and benefit of the Diocese, as such.

All other property belonging to the Diocese, as such, shall be held in the name of the corporation known as "Corporation of the Episcopal Diocese of Fort North," and no conveyance or encumbrance of any kind shall be valid unless executed by such corporation and as may otherwise be provided by the Canons of the Diocese.

#### CANONS

Canons not inconsistent with this Constitution, or the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention, may be adopted, altered, amended, or repealed at any Annual Convention by a majority vote of the Convention; provided that no new Canon and no alteration, amendment, or repeal of an existing Canon shall be adopted unless the same shall have been filed in writing with the Secretary of the Convention not less than sixty days before the meeting of the Convention. The Secretary shall, not less than forty-five days before the meeting of the Convention, deliver copies of all proposed amendments or alterations to the Canons to the Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons. The Committee shall report thereon to the Convention on the first day of the meeting. No other amendments or alterations to the Canons shall be considered at that meeting except by unanimous consent of the Convention.

Where any amendment of a Canon has been so proposed and referred to the Committee, amendments thereto may be made from the floor of the Convention, if, within the judgment of the presiding officer of the Convention, such amendments are germane to the pending amendment.

A new Canon or an alteration, amendment or repeal of an existing Canon shall take effect after the expiration of thirty days from the adjournment of the Convention at which such new Canon or such alteration, amendment or repeal of an existing Canon was adopted.



#### ENABLING CLAUSE

This Constitution shall commence and be in full force and effect on January 1, 1983.



#### CANON 11

#### CORPORATION OF THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF FORT WORTH

Sec. 11.1 Corporation of the Episcopal Diocese of Fort Worth is a non-profit benevolent and charitable organization organized under Texas laws, also known as the "Diocesan Corporation". In addition to its regular powers, it may receive, hold, manage and administer funds and properties acquired by gift or by will or otherwise for the use and benefit of the Diocese and any Diocesan institutions.

Sec. 11.2 The management of its affairs shall be conducted and administered by a Board of Trusteess of five (5) elected members; all of whom are either Lay persons in good standing of a parish or mission in the Diocese, or members of the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, in addition to the Bishop of the Diocese who shall serve as Chairman of the Board or may designate the President or other officer of the corporation to serve as such. The Board of Trustees shall have the power and authority to conduct the affairs of said corporation in accordance with its charter and by-laws and in accordance with the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese from time to time adopted.

Sec. 11.3 One member of the Board of Trustees shall be elected at each Annual Convention and each member shall serve a term of five (5) years. The terms of members shall be so arranged that the term of only one (1) member shall expire annually. The Board of Trustees shall fill any vacancy which occurs on the Board until the annual election. The Bishop shall nominate the members of the Board of Trustees.

Sec. 11.4 The Board of Trustees shall adopt its own by-laws and shall elect such officers as its by-laws may require.

Sec. 11.5 The Board of Trustees shall submit a report at each Annual Convention covering its operations for the preceding fiscal year and showing its financial condition. If and when required by the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Board of Trustees shall make such additional reports and furnish such additional information as may be requested. The books and records of the Board of Trustees shall at all times be open for inspection and examination by the Standing Committee of the Diocese or its representatives.

#### CANON 12

#### TITLE TO PROPERTY

quired by the Diocesan Corporation for its use and benefit and for use and benefit of parishes, missions and other diocesan organizations shall be held in the name of said corporation and may only be conveyed or encumbered with the approval of the Board of Trustees and in accordance with the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Diocese of Fort Worth. All of the assets and properties of the corporation and accumulations thereof shall be held and adproperties of the corporation and accumulations thereof shall be held and administered to effectuate its purpose. In case of the liquidation, dissolution or winding up of the corporations, whether voluntary or involuntary, or by operation of law, the assets or properties of the corporation shall be distributed in such manner as the Board of Trustees of the corporation shall direct, provided, however, that any such distribution shall be such as is calculated to be exclusively to carry out the purposes for which the corporation is formed or for one or more other exempt purposes within the meaning of the applicable provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended or any similar federal statute then in effect and rules and regulations pursuant thereto.

Sec. 12.2 The title to all real estate and other property owned or hereafter acquired for the use of the Church in this Diocese, as well as to property conveyed to Diocesan Institutions or for their use, shall be vested as provided in Article 13 of the Constitution.

Sec. 12:3 If it becomes necessary to sell or lease the property or otherwise dispose of it, the Corporation known as "The Corporation of the Episcopal Diocese of Fort Worth" with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee is hereby authorized to execute such legal instruments as may be necessary to convey, lease or effect such other disposition as is herein authorized.

Sec. 12.4 Real property acquired by the Corporation for the use of a particular parish or mission shall be held by the Corporation in trust for the use and benefit of such parish or mission. It is immaterial whether said acquisition is by conveyance to the Corporation by a parish or mission now holding title, by the Bishop now holding title as a corporate sole, or now holding title, by the Bishop now holding title as a corporate sole, or by subsequent conveyance to the Corporation, so long as such property was initially acquired by a parish or mission by purchase by its parishioners, initially acquired by a parish or mission. Such parish or mission or by gift or devise to it, as a parish or mission. Such parish or mission by a parish or mission by purchase by its parishion mission by a parish or mission property, but not for any administrative expenses attributable to curporation and will be responsible for the direct expenses of the Corporation. Property held in trust by the Corporation for a particular parish or mission may not be conveyed, leased or encumbered in any way by the Corporation without the written consent of the Rector, Mardens and Vestry of the parish, or the Wardens and Vestry of the mission, for which such property held in trust trust. Upon dissolution of a parish or mission, such property held in trust for it shall revert to the Corporation for the use and benefit of the Diocese, as such.

#### CONSTITUTION

#### **PREAMBLE**

The Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, otherwise known as The Episcopal Church (which name is hereby recognized as also designating the Church), is a constituent member of the Anglican Communion, a Fellowship within the One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Church, of those duly constituted Dioceses, Provinces, and regional Churches in communion with the See of Canterbury, upholding and propagating the historic Faith and Order as set forth in the Book of Common Prayer. This Constitution, adopted in General Convention in Philadelphia in October, 1789, as amended in subsequent General Conventions, sets forth the basic Articles for the government of this Church, and of its overseas missionary jurisdictions.

Name of Church.

Anglican Communion.

#### ARTICLE I

Sec. 1. There shall be a General Convention of this Church, consisting of the House of Bishops and the House of Deputies, which Houses shall sit and deliberate separately; and in all deliberations freedom of debate shall be allowed. Either House may originate and propose legislation, and all acts of the Convention shall be adopted and be authenticated by both Houses.

General Convention.

Sec. 2. Each Bishop of this Church having jurisdiction, every Bishop Coadjutor, every Suffragan Bishop, every Assistant Bishop, and every Bishop who by reason of advanced age or bodily infirmity, or who, under an election to an office created by the General Convention, or for reasons of mission strategy determined by action of the General Convention or the House of Bishops, has resigned a jurisdiction, shall have a seat and a vote in the House of Bishops. A majority of all Bishops entitled to vote, exclusive of Bishops who have resigned their jurisdiction or positions, shall be necessary to constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

House of

Quorum.

Sec. 3. At the General Convention next before the expiration of the term of office of the Presiding Bishop, it shall elect the Presiding Bishop of the Church. The House of Bishops shall choose one of the Bishops of this Church to be the Presiding Bishop of the Church by a vote of a majority of all Bishops, excluding retired Bishops not present, except that whenever two-thirds of the House of Bishops are present a majority vote shall suffice, such choice to be subject to confirmation by the House of Deputies. The term and tenure of office Term and and duties and particulars of the election not inconsistent with the tenure of Office. preceding provisions shall be prescribed by the Canons of the General Convention.

Election of Presiding Bishop.

But if the Presiding Bishop of the Church shall resign the office as Succession. such, or if by reason of infirmity shall become disabled, or in case of death, the Bishop who, according to the Rules of the House of

requires the affirmative vote in that order by a majority of the Dioceses present in that order.

Sec. 6. In either House any number less than a quorum may adjourn Adjournment. from day to day. Neither House, without the consent of the other, shall adjourn for more than three days, or to any place other than that in which the Convention shall be sitting.

Sec. 7. The General Convention shall meet not less than once in each Time and place three years, at a time and place determined in accordance with the of meeting. Canons. Special meetings may be held as provided for by Canon.

#### ARTICLE II

Sec. 1. In every Diocese the Bishop or the Bishop Coadjutor shall be Election of chosen agreeably to rules prescribed by the Convention of that Diocese, provided that the retirement date of the Bishop Diocesan shall not be more than thirty-six months after the consecration of the Bishop Coadjutor. Bishops of Missionary Dioceses shall be chosen in accordance with the Canons of the General Convention.

Sec. 2. No one shall be ordained and consecrated Bishop until the attainment of thirty years of age; nor without the consent of a majority of the Standing Committees of all the Dioceses, and the consent of a majority of the Bishops of this Church exercising jurisdiction. But if the election shall have taken place within one hundred twenty days before the meeting of General Convention, the consent of the House of Deputies shall be required in place of that of a majority of the Standing Committees. No one shall be ordained and consecrated Bishop by fewer than three Bishops.

Required age. Consent to election.

Sec. 3. A Bishop shall confine the exercise of such office to the Diocese in which elected, unless requested to perform episcopal acts in another Diocese by the Ecclesiastical Authority thereof, or unless authorized by the House of Bishops, or by the Presiding Bishop by its direction, to act temporarily in case of need within any territory not yet organized into Dioceses of this Church.

Consecration.

Sec. 4. It shall be lawful for a Diocese, at the request of the Bishop of Bishops that Diocese, to elect not more than two Suffragan Bishops, without right of succession, and with seat and vote in the House of Bishops. A Suffragan Bishop shall be consecrated and hold office under such conditions and limitations other than those provided in this Article as may be provided by Canons of the General Convention. A Suffragan Bishop shall be eligible for election as Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor of a Diocese, or as a Suffragan in another Diocese.

Jurisdiction of Bishops.

Sec. 5. It shall be lawful for a Diocese to prescribe by the Constitution and Canons of such Diocese that upon the death of the Bishop, a Suffragan Bishop of that Diocese may be placed in charge of such Diocese and become temporarily the Ecclesiastical Authority thereof until such time as a new Bishop shall be chosen and consecrated; or that during the disability or absence of the Bishop, a Bishop Suffragan

between meetings of the Convention may be prescribed by the Canons of the respective Dioceses. When there is a Bishop in charge of the Diocese, the Standing Committee shall be the Bishop's Council of Advice. If there be no Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor or Suffragan Bishop canonically authorized to act, the Standing Committee shall be the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese for all purposes declared by the General Convention. The rights and duties of the Standing Committee, except as provided in the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention, may be prescribed by the Canons of the respective Dioceses.

#### ARTICLE V

Sec. 1. A new Diocese may be formed, with the consent of the General Admission of Convention and under such conditions as the General Convention new Dioceses. shall prescribe by General Canon or Canons, (1) by the division of an existing Diocese; (2) by the junction of two or more Dioceses or of parts of two or more Dioceses; or (3) by the erection into a Diocese of an unorganized area evangelized as provided in Article VI. The proceedings shall originate in a Convocation of the Clergy and Laity of the unorganized area called by the Bishop for that purpose; or, with the approval of the Bishop, in the Convention of the Diocese to be divided; or (when it is proposed to form a new Diocese by the junction of two or more existing Dioceses or of parts of two or more Dioceses) by mutual agreement of the Conventions of the Dioceses concerned, with the approval of the Bishop of each Diocese. In case the Episcopate of a Diocese be vacant, no proceedings toward its division shall be taken until the vacancy is filled. After consent of the General Convention, when a certified copy of the duly adopted Constitution of the new Diocese, including an unqualified accession to the Constitution and Canons of this Church, shall have been filed with the Secretary of the General Convention and approved by the Executive Council of this Church, such new Diocese shall thereupon be in union with the General Convention.

Sec. 2. In case one Diocese shall be divided into two or more Dioceses, the Bishop of the Diocese divided, at least thirty days before such division, shall select the Diocese in which the Bishop will continue in jurisdiction. The Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, subsequently and before the effective date of the division shall select the Diocese in which the Bishop Coadjutor shall continue in jurisdiction, and if it not be the Diocese selected by the Bishop shall become the Bishop thereof.

Sec. 3. In case a Diocese shall be formed out of parts of two or more Dioceses, each of the Bishops and Bishops Coadjutor of the several Dioceses out of which the new Diocese has been formed shall be entitled, in order of seniority of consecration, to the choice between the Bishop's Diocese and the new Diocese so formed. In the case the new Diocese shall not be so chosen, it shall have the right to choose its own Bishop.

Any territorial jurisdiction or any part of the same, which may have Retrocession been ceded by a Diocese under the foregoing provision, may be retroceded to the said Diocese by such joint action of all the several parties as is herein required for its cession, save that in the case of retrocession of territory the consent of Parishes within the territory retroceded shall not be necessary; Provided, that such action of the General Convention, whether of cession or retrocession, shall be by a vote of two-thirds of all the Bishops present and voting and by a vote by orders in the House of Deputies in accordance with Article I, Section 5, except that concurrence by the orders shall require the affirmative vote in each order by two-thirds of the Dioceses.

Sec. 3. Missionary Dioceses shall be organized as may be prescribed by Canon of the General Convention.

Missionary Dioceses.

#### ARTICLE VII

Dioceses may be united into Provinces in such manner, under such Provinces. conditions, and with such powers, as shall be provided by Canon of the General Convention; Provided, however, that no Diocese shall be included in a Province without its own consent.

#### ARTICLE VIII

No person shall be ordered Priest or Deacon to minister in this Requisites for Church until the person shall have been examined by the Bishop and two Priests and shall have exhibited such testimonials and other requisites as the Canons in that case provided may direct. No person shall be ordained and consecrated Bishop, or ordered Priest or Deacon to minister in this Church, unless at the time, in the presence of the ordaining Bishop or Bishops, the person shall subscribe and make the following declaration:

ordination.

I do believe the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be the Word of God, and to contain all things necessary to salvation; and I do solemnly engage to conform to the Doctrine, Discipline, and Worship of the Episcopal Church.

Declaration.

Provided, however, that any person consecrated a Bishop to minister in Proviso. any Diocese of an autonomous Church or Province of a Church in communion with this Church may, instead of the foregoing declaration, make the promises of Conformity required by the Church in which the Bishop is to minister.

If any Bishop ordains a Priest or Deacon to minister elsewhere than in this Church, or confers ordination as Priest or Deacon upon a Christian minister who has not received Episcopal ordination, the Bishop shall do so only in accordance with such provisions as shall be set forth in the Canons of this Church.

#### ORGANIZATION AND ADMINISTRATION

#### CANON 10: Of New Dioceses

Sec. 1. Whenever a new Diocese shall be formed within the limits of Primary any Diocese, or by the junction of two or more Dioceses, or parts of Dioceses, and such action shall have been ratified by the General Convention, the Bishop of the Diocese within the limits of which a Diocese is formed, or in case of the junction of two or more Dioceses, or parts of Dioceses, the senior Bishop by consecration, shall thereupon call the Primary Convention of the new Diocese, for the purpose of enabling it to organize, and shall fix the time and place of holding the same, such place being within the territorial limits of the new Diocese.

Convention.

Sec. 2. In case there should be no Bishop who can call such Primary How called with Convention, pursuant to the foregoing provision, then the duty of no Bishop. calling such Convention for the purpose of organizing and of fixing the time and place of its meeting, shall be vested in the Standing Committee of the Diocese within the limits of which the new one is erected, or in the Standing Committee of the oldest of the Dioceses by the junction of which, or of parts of which, the new Diocese may be formed. And such Standing Committee shall make the call immediately after ratification of the General Convention.

Sec. 3. Whenever one Diocese is about to be divided into two Dioceses, the Convention of such Diocese shall declare which portion thereof is to be in the new Diocese, and shall make the same known to the General Convention before the ratification of such division.

Division of existing Diocese.

Sec. 4. Whenever a new Diocese shall have organized in Primary Convention in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution and Canons in such case made and provided, and in the manner prescribed in the previous Sections of this Canon, and shall have chosen a name and acceded to the Constitution of the General Convention in accordance with Article V, Section 1 of the Constitution, and shall have laid before the Executive Council certified copies of the Constitution adopted at its Primary Convention, and the proceedings preparatory to the formation of the proposed new Diocese, such new Diocese shall thereupon be admitted into union with the General Convention.

How admitted into union with General Convention.

Sec. 5. In the event of the erection of an Area Mission into a Diocese Convocation of this Church, as provided in Article V, Sec. 1, the Convocation of the said Area Mission shall be entitled to elect Deputies to the succeeding General Convention, and also to elect a Bishop. The jurisdiction previously assigned to the Bishop in the Area Mission shall be terminated upon the admission of the new Diocese.

Sec. 6 (a) When a Diocese, and another Diocese which has been Provision for formed either by division therefrom or by erection into a Diocese or a Missionary Diocese formed by division therefrom, shall desire to be reunited into one Diocese, the proposed reunion must be initiated by a mutual agreement between the Conventions of the two Dioceses, consented to by the Ecclesiastical Authority of each Diocese. (c) If a member of this Church, not having such a certificate, desires to become a member of a congregation in the place to which he or she has removed, that person shall be directed by the Member of the Clergy in charge of the said congregation to procure a certificate from the former congregation, although on failure to produce such a certificate through no fault of the person applying, appropriate entry may be made in the parish register upon the evidence of membership status sufficient in the judgment of the Member of the Clergy in charge or Warden.

(d) Any communicant of any Church in communion with this Church shall be entitled to the benefit of this section so far as the same can be made applicable.

Sec. 5. No one shall be denied rights, status or access to an equal place Rights of Laity. in the life, worship, and governance of this Church because of race, color, ethnic origin, national origin, marital status, sex, sexual orientation, disabilities or age, except as otherwise specified by Canons.

Sec. 6. A person to whom the Sacraments of the Church shall have Refusal of Holy been refused, or who has been repelled from the Holy Communion under the rubrics, or who has been informed of an intention to refuse or repel him or her from the Holy Communion under the rubrics, may appeal to the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority. A Priest who refuses or repels a person from the Holy Communion, or who communicates to a person an intent to repel that person from the Holy Communion shall inform that person, in writing, within fourteen days thereof of (i) the reasons therefor and (ii) his or her right to appeal to the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority. No Member of the Clergy of this Church shall be required to admit to the Sacraments a person so refused or repelled without the written direction of the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority. The Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority may in certain circumstances see fit to require the person to be admitted or restored because of the insufficiency of the cause assigned by the member of the Clergy. If it shall appear to the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority that there is sufficient cause to justify refusal of the Holy Communion, however, appropriate steps shall be taken to institute such inquiry as may be directed by the Canons of the Diocese; and should no such Canon exist, the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority shall proceed according to such principles of law and equity as will ensure an impartial investigation and judgment, which judgment shall be made in writing within sixty days of the appeal and which shall also specify the steps required for readmission to Holy Communion.

Sec. 7. No unbaptized person shall be eligible to receive Holy Communion in this Church.

Sec. 8. Any person accepting any office in this Church shall well and faithfully perform the duties of that office in accordance with the

CANON I.18.1-3

TITLE I

Constitution and Canons of this Church and of the Diocese in which the office is being exercised.

#### CANON 18: Of the Solemnization of Holy Matrimony

Legal and canonical requirements.

Sec. 1. Every Member of the Clergy of this Church shall conform to the laws of the State governing the creation of the civil status of marriage, and also to the laws of this Church governing the solemnization of Holy Matrimony.

Conditions.

Sec. 2. Before solemnizing a marriage the Member of the Clergy shall have ascertained:

Laws of State.

(a) That both parties have the right to contract a marriage according to the laws of the State.

Understanding Holy Matrimony.

(b) That both parties understand that Holy Matrimony is a physical and spiritual union of a man and a woman, entered into within the community of faith, by mutual consent of heart, mind, and will, and with intent that it be lifelong.

Free consent.

(c) That both parties freely and knowingly consent to such marriage, without fraud, coercion, mistake as to identity of a partner, or mental reservation.

One party baptized. Instruction.

(d) That at least one of the parties has received Holy Baptism.

(e) That both parties have been instructed as to the nature, meaning, and purpose of Holy Matrimony by the Member of the Clergy, or that they have both received such instruction from persons known by the Member of the Clergy to be competent and responsible.

Procedures.

Sec. 3. No Member of the Clergy of this Church shall solemnize any marriage unless the following procedures are complied with:

Thirty days' notice.

(a) The intention of the parties to contract marriage shall have been signified to the Member of the Clergy at least thirty days before the service of solemnization; *Provided*, that for weighty cause, this requirement may be dispensed with if one of the parties is a member of the Congregation of the Member of the Clergy, or can furnish satisfactory evidence of responsibility.

In case the thirty days' notice is waived, the Member of the Clergy shall report such action in writing to the Bishop immediately.

Witnesses.

(b) There shall be present at least two witnesses to the solemnization of marriage.




(c) The Member of the Clergy shall record in the proper register the date and place of the marriage, the names of the parties and their parents, the age of the parties, their residences, and their Church status; the witnesses and the Member of the Clergy shall sign the record.

Declaration of Intention.

(d) The Member of the Clergy shall have required that the parties sign the following declaration:

(e) "We, A.B. and C.D., desiring to receive the blessing of Holy Matrimony in the Church, do solemnly declare that we hold



At a meeting of the Clergy and Laily of the Protestant Bpissopal Church in the State of Texas, celled by the Right Rev. C. W. Freeman, D. D., Missionary Bishop, exercising Episcopal Interactions in the said State, at their request, and held in Christ Church, in the city of Maugorda, on Monday, the first day of organizing the Church in said State, into a propriety of organizing the Church in said State, into a Diocesse: there were present of the Clergy, Eav. Bush, Esq., from St., John's Clurch, Brazoria County; and Col. Geo. Fisher, and W. M. Taylor, Esq., from Christ Church, Houston, of whom the following were present; Matthew Talbot, Esq., James Dennison, Esq., Thomas C. Stewart, Esq., William L. Sartwell, Esq., and Dr. P. A. Davenport.

## Of Assistant Bishops.

SECTION I. When a Bishop of a Diocese, by reason of old age or other permanent cause of infirmity, or because of a judicial sentence of suspension, either definite or indefinite, having been heretofore pronounced against him, or which may be hereafter pronounced against him, is unable to discharge his Episcopal duties, one Assistant Bishop may be elected by and for said Biocese, who shall in all cases succeed the Bishop in case of surviving him, or in case of the resignation of the Bishop. Provided, that when said Assistant Bishop is elected, because of old age or other permanent infirmity of the incumbent, he shall perform such Episcopal duties, and exercise such Episcopal authority in the Diocese as the Bishop shall assign him; but where the Convention of the Diocese declares the Bishop's inability to discharge such duties, or where such Assistant Bishop is elected by reason of a sentence of suspension having been pronounced against the Bishop, then and in either of said cases, the said Assistant Bishop shall, during such inability, or during such asspension, perform all the duties, and exercise all the authority which appertains to the authority and office of a Bishop. Provided further, that no person shall be elected or consecrated a suffragan Bishop.

Secrion 2. The sixth Canon of 1832 is hereby declared to be repealed.

### TEXAS.

The Church in this State was organized into a Diocese on the first day of January, 1849. The first Annual Convention met at Christ Church, Houston, on the 9th of May, A.D. 1850; from the Journal of which we learn that there are eight Clergymen, besides the Provisional Bishop, connected with this field, and that ten organized parishes have been admitted into union with the Convention of the Diocese. In seven of these parishes, since the Primary Convention, there have been 192 infants and 19 adults baptized; 80 persons confirmed; 14 marriages celebrated; and 31 funerals attended. In six parishes, the whole number of communicants is 262; and in three, the number of Sunday School Teachers amounts to 33, and of Scholars to 210.

One Candidate for Orders has been admitted to the Diaconate, and one Deacon has been ordained Priest.

There are some important places within our vast territory where our Church may be established, had we Clergymen qualified for the work. The persevering and consistent Minister of Christ can soon work. The persevering and consistent Minister of Uhrist can soon gather around him a congregation of respectful worshippers, if not of devoted Churchmen; and our prayer is that the Great Head of the Church will direct the attention of some of our brethren, who may be suited, to labor amongst a community remarkable for general intelligence, towards those places in our State where their work, under God, would be ultimately crowned with success. 1850.]





the Board of Missions," which seems to have escaped from the general draw-back. This less conspicuous and more quiot agency, led on by delicate, yet heroic spirits, has abundantly prospered. Boxes of clothing, contributions in household comforts, medicines and hospital stores—in addition to supplies in money—have been placed at its disposal almost without stint, which have been sent upon occasion to the sick Indian and the naked Afric, as well as to the destitute Pastor and his family. Busy hands have been enlisted by its charity, both far and near, from the Mission Schools of Greece, to little circles of helping women on our Western border. Many a latent energy has it kindly evoked and silent sympathy has it called into play. Too much can hardly be said in commendation of its service, both directly to the cause of Christian beneficence and in the way of a wholesome employment of womanly zeal and love.

In fulfilment of their duty, as appointed by the House of Deputies, to consider and report upon the matter in hand, your Committee herewith submit the results of their inquiries in a few brief notes, prepared by their order in the several subdivisions of their body.

### DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

This Figure.—The Church has included within the bounds of Dioceses or Missionary Jurisdictions all the territory of the United States, except that portion lately acquired from Russia, and commonly called Alaska. The field for Domestic Missions remains therefore the same in respect to dimensions, from year to year, unless new area be brought under the National Government. But the cultivated part of this field may be extended by the zeal and fidelity of the Church, in obedience to her Lord, and beneath His blessing. Thanks to Him, to-day, that as the Territories have been peopled these last few years, Missionary Bishops and Presbyters have pressed forward as rapidly as emigrants before them! In organized Dioceses, too, the Church has not been neglectful, but has sought new places continually for settlement and labor.

has not been neglectful, but has sought new places continually for settlement and labor.

The doings of the General Convention at this present session of 1874, all agreeably to the convictions and desires of the Board of Missions, need not be recounted. Suffice it to say, that from the Dioceses of Teras and California large tracts have been set off and given up as Missionary Territory, and that three or more new Domestic Missionary Bishops have been or will be appointed.

THE LIBOREES.—The experience of the Church has proved that it is far easier to secure men of ability to fill the Missionary Episcopate than that of the single Missionary. But what can Bishops accomplish single-handed and alone? Without the assistance of clergymen they can only begin the task which they must leave unfinished. Your Committee observe with sorrow, yea, with alarm, how slowly grows the list of the Clerical Order. During the pastsix years but about seventy-eight candidates have been annually ordained in the whole American Church, while the number looking forward to the Priesthood has actually diminished. Deducting ministers borne to the rest of Paradisa, and those who from sickness or age have been laid aside from duty, either wholly or in part, the Church cannot but feel imperatively called upon to address her prayer to the Lord, that "He would send forth more laborers into His harvest." No exertion should she spare by legislation, charity, and active influence, to lift up the ratio of clerical increase to a more just proportion to ber needs, and to those of our country. With the failure of the clergy [must follow that of the missionaries, and then of missions.
